

67		Some Dogs Do, by Jez Alborough. Walker Books.	On the way to school one day, Sid is so full of happiness that he starts to fly. But no one believes him. "Dogs don't fly," they say. Poor Sid is miserable, until his Dad lets him in on an amazing secret: some dogs do!
68	Senshine	Sunshine by Jan Ormerod. Walker Books.	It's morning, and the first rays of sunlight shine into a little girls bedroom and wake her up. She gets out of bed and gets ready to start her day. A wordless book.






